INTENSIVE COURSE IN DIGESTIVE PATHOLOGY

May 12-14, 2019 VALIS Hotel - Agria, Magnesia, Greece

The Mount Pelion Intensive Courses in Pathology are organized annually by the Hellenic Division, IAP in Agria, a village by the seashore of Mount Pelion. The Courses are thought to represent the Centaur Chiron -Asclepius Legacy, in terms of continuous transfer of medical knowledge. This is because, according to the Hellenic Mythology, Centaur Chiron was the teacher in Medicine of Asclepius and of other Homeric heroes of Thessaly, such as Kings Achilles and Peleas.

Digestive Pathology, the 2nd Course of this series, held in May 12-14, 2019, was partly supported by funds of the Education Committee of the IAP.

As the main goal of the IAP is education, our intention was to motivate our friends pathologists mostly from Eastern European and Balkan Countries and offer them an important educational event.

In collaboration with members of the Executive Committee of our Division, particularly with Dina Tiniakos, we have prepared a constructive and up-todate scientific program, covering the majority of the subject, including WHO classifications and beyond.

All invited speakers were renowned pathologists, panelists or/and contributors to the WHO Blue Book classification editions. Therefore, their participation anticipated a high educational impact from the Course.

The members of our faculty, a team of experts on this topics, spread-out a positive spirit and energy. The tutors provided 18 hours presentations on 72 topics, covering a wide spectrum of the Digestive Pathology. 
